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About Us

In 1991, an ambitious and dedicated group of individuals involved in long term care gathered together in Pictou County to form the Alzheimer Disease and Related Dementia Advisory Committee (ARDAC). In 2006, this group incorporated as a Society under the name Nova Scotia Alzheimer Disease and Other Dementia Care Course. With the 7th Edition, the group changed its incorporated name to Dementia: Understanding the Journey Society.

The educational goal of the founding committee was to develop a provincially recognized course to address the needs of persons living with dementia; based on the philosophy that persons with dementia have the same basic needs for security, shelter, nutrition, and affection as other adults, and have the same rights to have these basic needs met.

Over the years, the Board of Directors has been comprised of a variety of dedicated individuals from a number of backgrounds; including physicians, nurses, recreation and occupational therapists, dieticians, educators, administrators, and family members.

The group continues to change but their focus remains the same, to promote a person-centred approach to providing care and services for persons living with dementia through the ongoing development, promotion, and administration of Dementia: Understanding the Journey.

The efforts of the Board are further enhanced by strong relationships with health care employers and employer associations, the Department of Health and Wellness, the Alzheimer Society of Nova Scotia, the Nova Scotia Centre on Aging, post-secondary education institutions, and Veterans' Services Canada. Together we seek to maintain and build upon the success of our course.

Accomplishing Our Goals

Continuously improve Dementia: Understanding the Journey to meet the needs of health care clients and providers.

Evolving the Facilitator's Manual

After a period of growth and development for the learner's manual, this year the Board turned their attention to the continued development of the facilitation process and tools to enhance the consistency of education.

In January 2018, the Board contracted with Marlene Fairhurst-Vaughan to overhaul the facilitators manual incorporating enhanced facilitator tools. The new manual, will direct a stronger consistency in the education delivered across the province with the goal to improve the care provided by graduates of the course.

To promote consistent education the facilitators manual continues to embrace the concept of multidisciplinary audiences with varying degrees of experience with dementia care; however, key changes include:




- ✦ Speaking notes for each mini-lecture incorporating the key learning points/messages
- ✦ Alignment of teaching resources to each mini-lecture and key learning points/messages
- ✦ Standardized Power Points for each session
 - Emphasizes key learning points/messages
 - Aligns resources to each mini-lecture and key learning points/messages
 - Resource links embedded in slides
 - Aligns Power Point note section to the manual's speaking notes
 - Incorporates consistent Dementia: Understanding the Journey imaging
- ✦ Facilitation/teaching expectations and guides
- ✦ Marking rubric for the project
- ✦ Protocols for the selection/use of additional resources during course delivery


This update was piloted by five facilitators who worked with Marlene and course administration to provide feedback on the new materials. Based on the positive results,

Marlene developed and delivered an orientation session for current facilitators to learn about the new updates. Facilitators received a copy of the updated manual upon registering for the orientation.


This mandatory orientation was delivered exclusively via Skype to 70 facilitators, over 3 sessions. Feedback from the orientation sessions was very positive, facilitators felt the Skype sessions worked very well and the changes to the manual were well received.

Facilitator Orientations

Jody MacDonald, Dementia: Understanding the Journey Society Chair, hosted a facilitator orientation session in Sydney on September 14, 2018. As a result, 4 new facilitators are certified to deliver the 7th Edition. The orientation session featured a review of new materials and activities for getting to know the new manuals, as well as a review of administrative procedures.

Strategic Planning

In the fall of 2018 the Dementia: Understanding the Journey Board engaged with Wayne Marsh, Independent Facilitation Services to lead the Board through a strategic planning process with the goal of revising, if necessary, the Mission, Vision, Values, setting long term strategic goals, and short-term operational goals.

Looking Ahead

We look forward to the new and exciting directions strategic planning will take us. We will continue to focus on the development of the facilitation process and tools, including a revamp of the facilitator's orientation session. Orientation sessions have been planned for new facilitators in May and June of 2019.

Expand participation in Dementia: Understanding the Journey

The course has been a component of the Continuing Care Assistant program since 2000, the Practical Nursing program since 2009, the Dalhousie School of Nursing since 2014, Cape Breton University Nursing Program since 2016, and most recently part of the St. FX Nursing program as of 2019. As a component of these programs, consistent foundational knowledge is incorporated across three key members of the care team. The benefit to those we serve will be immense as more and more care partners have the same knowledge and understanding in the provision of dementia care.

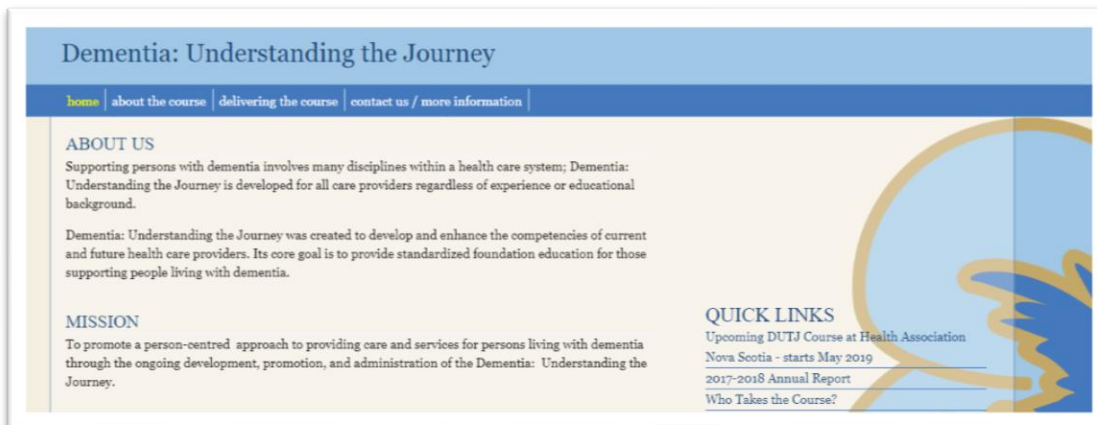

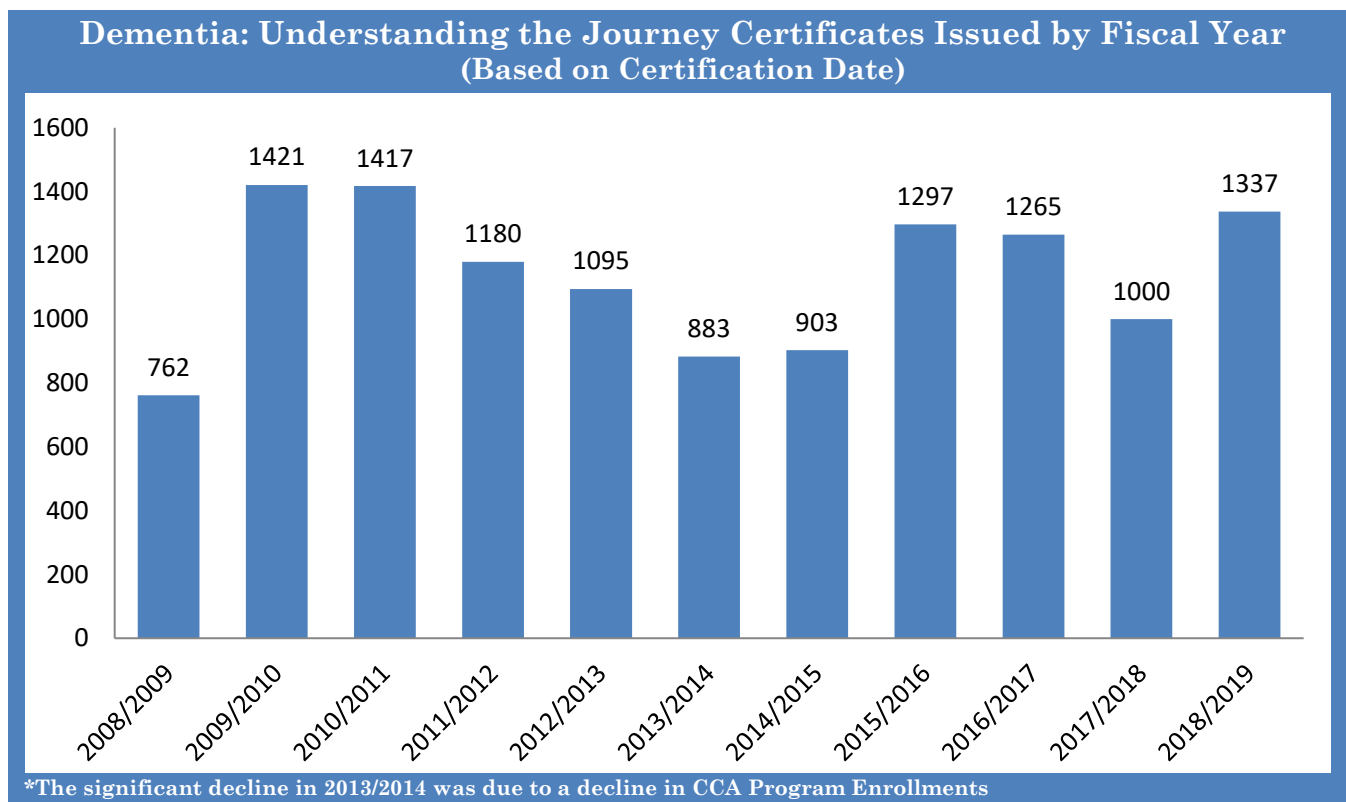
New Website Launch

The Dementia: Understanding the Journey Society launched an updated website to correspond with the new 7th Edition materials. Course Delivery and Statistics

For the fiscal year April 1, 2018 to March 31, 2019, 33 organizations delivered 66 courses which resulted in a total of 1,337 certificates issued. There were three courses hosted by the Dementia: Understanding the Journey Society at Health Association Nova Scotia resulting in 29 learners receiving certificates. 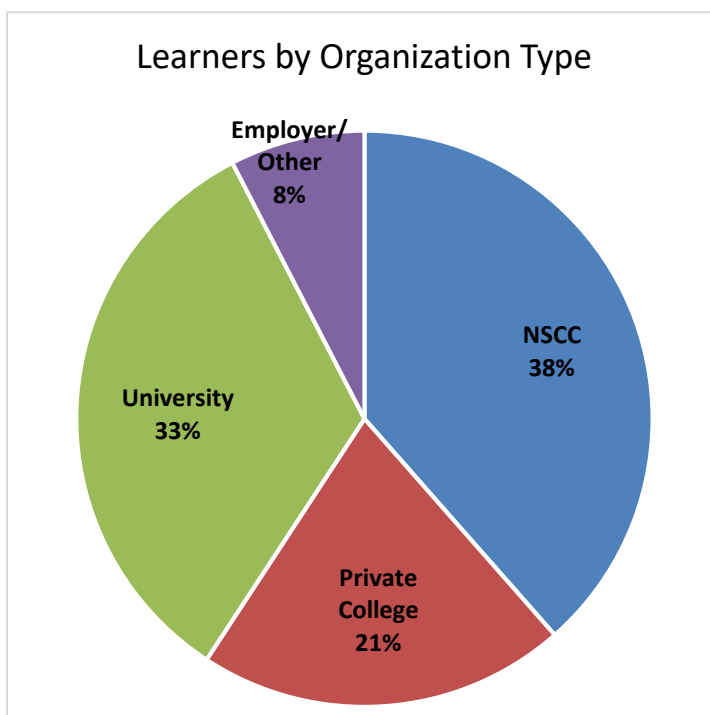
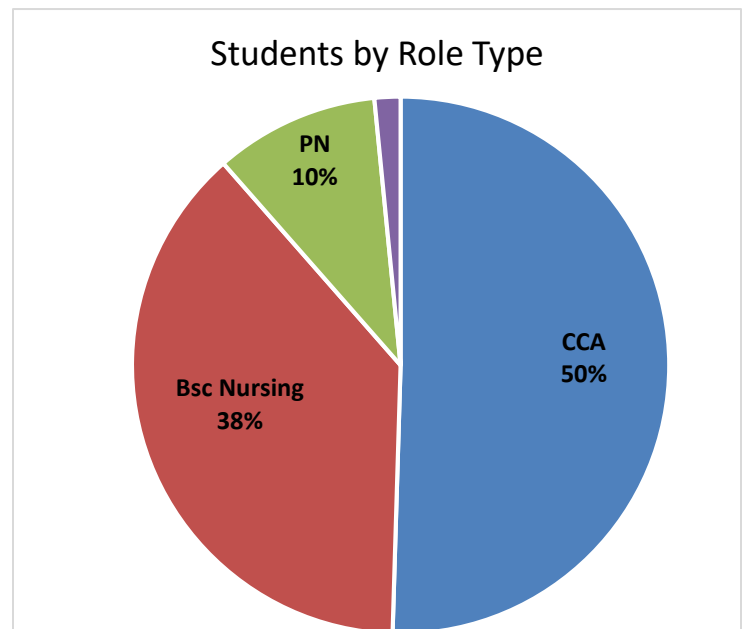
Looking Ahead

The 2018/2019 year saw a growth in participants, with the number of certificates issued being the highest since 2010/2011. The Dementia: Understanding the Journey Society will continue to focus on expanding the course into different organizations and education programs.

Collect and use evidence to evaluate the effectiveness of the education and the care practices the course advocates for

Dementia: Understanding the Journey administration has undergone significant changes with the introduction of a new database in 2017/2018. We are now able to track student and facilitator data quickly and efficiently, as well as produce comprehensive reports on multiple areas of course delivery.

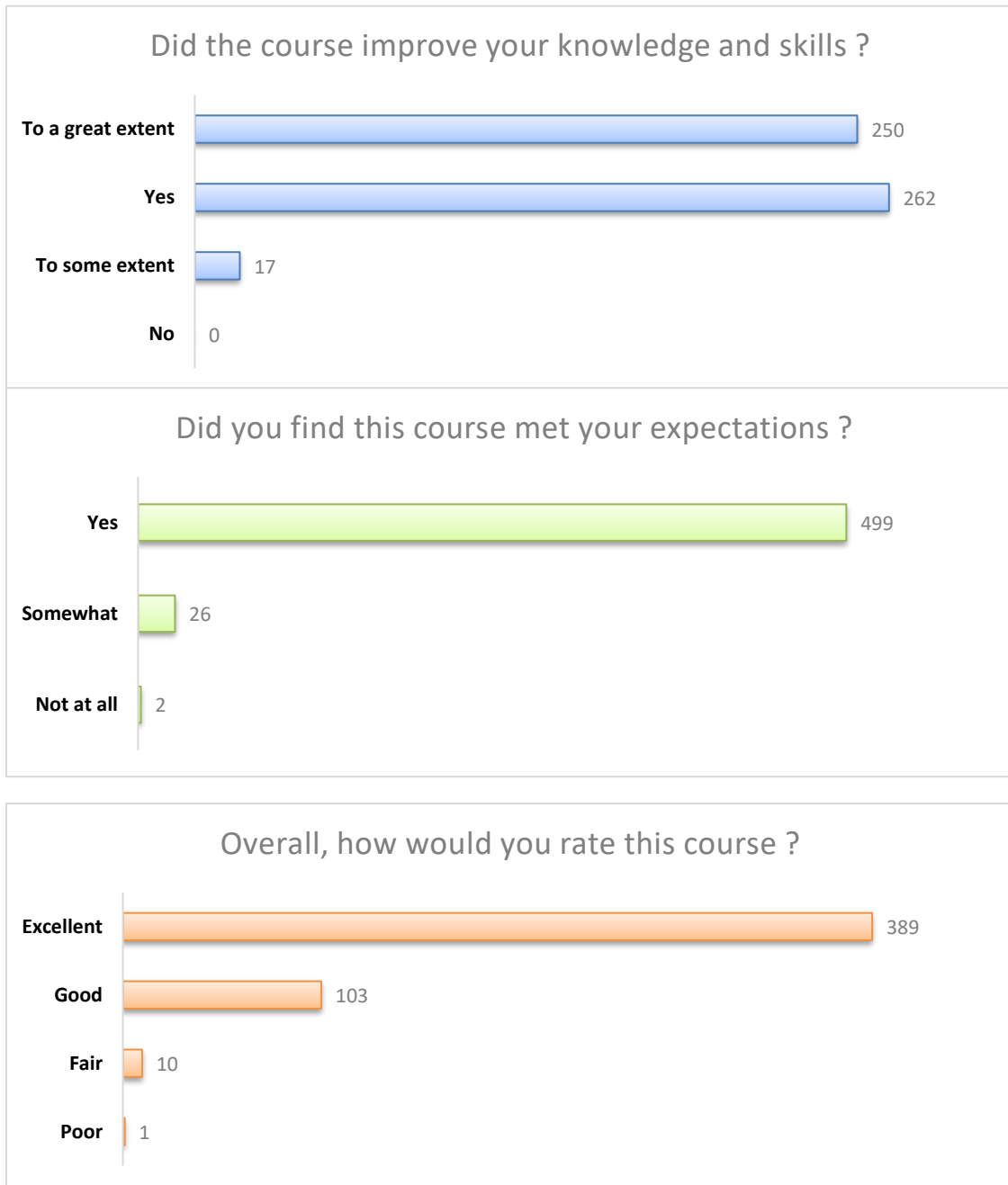
Upon completing the course, learners submit an Information Form which asks learners to indicate their role (student, health care professional, administration, etc.) and role type (CCA, LPN, RN, Dietary, etc.). This information helps us understand more about the learner population of the course and how it evolves over time. In 2018/2019, 88% of learners were students, with 50% of those students in the CCA program, 38% in the BSc Nursing program, and 10% in the PN program.



We are also able to identify the organization type and location through which the learner has taken the course. The chart to the right indicates the percentage of certificates issued from different organization types. Most learners attended the course through an education institution with 38% from NSCC, 33% from a University and 21% from a private college.

Learner Evaluations

Upon completing the course, learners are asked to submit an anonymous evaluation to DUTJ course administration. These evaluations are compiled to ensure continuous quality control. Below are the results from three of the questions on the evaluation. As the charts indicate, the feedback from learners is resoundingly positive!



Learner Feedback

I have learned a great deal through this course. I have learned to be more compassionate, understanding the needs of an individual with dementia and will use my knowledge to my best ability.

I learned so much about the range of dementia, that all behaviour has meaning. I learned how a health team works together to care of individuals with dementia. I learned enough to fill 100 pages. Loved it all.
